Dear Friends who are The Presbyterian Church in Westfield,

"With all wisdom and insight he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, as a plan for the fulness of time, to gather up all things in him, things on heaven and things on earth."

~ The Letter to the Ephesians

I have been reflecting on these words from one of my favorite letters in all of scripture over the past several weeks. The phrases "wisdom and insight" and "fulness of time" and "gather up all things" have been co-mingling in a veritable fugue. On some days I have been convinced it is all bunk. On other days the passage has given me great hope. At the end of the day, these words have given me room and space to name how much I miss you all, and how deeply I wish we were able to *regather* in the halls of the buildings we use to learn, connect, serve, and most important, worship.

Our Session has been working with leadership teams for some weeks now to gain "wisdom and insight" into the mystery that is regaining access to our buildings in ways that can be safe for all. It is an immense challenge. To accomplish this goal our Session has formed a new task force made up of ministry team leaders to explore specifically if and how we could safely resume in-person worship out of doors. Quinlan) will be working closely to bring a report to Session in early July with specific guidelines for regathering and to provide Session with the tools necessary to assess whether a group satisfies these guidelines when seeking use of space. In establishing these guidelines, these leaders will continue to abide by the NJ government guidelines for stages of reentry (we are currently in Stage 2), and the accompanying guidelines adopted on June 10th by our own Presbytery of Elizabeth that can be accessed online at their website: elizabethpresbytery.org.

The circumstances around regathering can get overwhelming rather quickly and there are many variables to consider. I ask for your prayers for this Task Force and our Session as we continue to work to discover when "in the fulness of time" we will be gathered together in person once more.

Until that time, we will continue to connect over the phone and through social media, including our remote weekly worship services.

From Our Music Director

Thank you, choir!

The only certainty in life is change, and we've all had our share lately, that's for sure. In worship planning, we've worked hard to infuse with meaning our worship through online platforms, while at the same time achieving some continuity between worship "before" and now. I've been asked how the choir recordings that you've heard in these recent months were made - a common question is "were those recorded 'before'?" No, we've made those recordings since we began our pause from gathered-in-person worship. The short version of our process is: 1) I make a "master" recording of the parts in a given song; 2) choir members (each using the "master" to ensure consistency) make individual recordings of their parts and send those to me; 3) through a computer program I do my best to combine all of the individual tracks and hopefully help us to sound as though we're singing together in person.

Thank you, choir, for - continuing to raise your voices in song, all the time, gathered in one time and space or not. I know that Kevin and the wired band have used a similar process to record music for worship -- thanks also to Kevin and the band for all of your music.

I know that we've all had to make many changes in how we live our day-to-day lives. While it is true that our congregational life might look different in its outward appearance, it is very much the same in that we continue to teach and learn together, worship and pray together, care for each other and our community (near and far) together, and enjoy each other's company -- in fellowship and meetings -- most often virtually -- but enjoying just the same. I'm always glad to be part of the PCW community, and look forward every day to living out our mission with all of you. Thank you everyone for walking together through this chapter of our church life.


Summer Zoom Book Group




Theology Discussion Group

Join our Next Discussion

We invite you to join us as we read and reflect on Thomas Merton's *No Man Is an Island*. We will be reading this book throughout the summer and will meet via Zoom beginning on Monday, September 21, 2020, 7:30-9pm. Beginning in October, we will meet on the first and third Monday evenings from 7:30-9pm of each month, reflecting on 2 chapters during each meeting.

"This is a powerful, classic work by a deeply thoughtful man of God. There are many topics beyond hope, of course. But at the core of the book is a longing for God, a longing that is powered by the hope Merton has in God. You finish the book feeling challenged, enriched, and eager. Each of the sixteen essays, on such topics as Sincerity, Mercy, and Vocation, have a hopeful quality about the human spiritual life. There is an assurance here that comes from the faith of the author, which of course stems from the God of his faith."



Merton found many parallels between the language of these Christian mystics and the language of Eastern philosophy.

NJFO—Planning for Post Covid-19

A moderate plan that focuses on the safety of patrons and keeps in mind the financial challenges of COVID-19 is in the works for the New Jersey Festival Orchestra's 2020-21 season, the orchestra's director said.

While coronavirus cut the last season short, Music Director David Wroe said, the NJFO is in identifying concept plans for the next season, selecting specific music and identifying soloists.

"I am of the strong belief that arts are an essential part of the fabric of our society — bonding people in solidarity and creating a culture of mutual empathy and understanding to form a collective community spirit," Wroe said. "I cannot imagine a time when a catalyst such as music is more needed. It is with this motivation that we at the NJ Festival Orchestra are resolute in planning for the future by presenting a 2020-21 season."

The season, he said, will be more modest than usual due to the financial challenges COVID-19 has presented.


"Realizing dreams are built upon the backbone of a sound operational plan, we have recognized the unprecedented financial pressure the pandemic has inflicted upon individuals and companies, thereby limiting the life blood of an orchestra such as ours — revenue through donations and ticket sales," Wroe said.

When the orchestra is permitted to play for audiences, he said, it will ensure the audience is safe.

"We are presently designing a comprehensive concert protocol which incorporates CDC guidelines to hold a large gathering," Wroe said. "Sterilization, social distancing, personal protective equipment, and instantaneous temperature taking are all strategies under consideration."

Among the performances set for the season is the NJFO's "Opera's Ultimate odd Couple," which is to feature the coupling of I Pagliacci and Wagner's Die Walkure (Act 1)," Wroe said.

February 2021 will see a multi community commemorative concert to, simultaneously, remember those lost to the pandemic and celebrate the front-line workers," he added. "These are just some of the exciting plans in the pipeline for NJFO's devotees."
